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

Virginia had the highest level of reported federal spending in FY 2012, followed by California and Texas. Maryland and D.C. were in the top ten states for reported spending, at #4 and #6, respectively.

The three states combined had a total of \$101.1B in reported federal spending.





Total Reported Federal Spending by Department DC, MD & VA


FY 2009-2012



There is a near even - 55/45 percent - split between Defense and Civilian spending in the area, with **Defense totaling \$230.4B and Civilian totaling \$186B**.

- Army and Navy spending totaled \$85B and \$81B, respectively.
- Regional Army spending declined with a -4% CAGR, driven by a reduction in AEC spending of \$2.2B from FY 2009 to FY 2012 as work was completed in support of BRAC requirements.
- Despite declines in AEC and Defense & Aerospace spending, Navy spending remained essentially flat with a 1% CAGR, driven by increased IT spending on the NGEN program in Herndon, Arlington, and Quantico, VA.
- A combination of increased spending on the DISA Global Information Grid (GIG) and Special Operations Tailored Logistics programs contributed to **modest growth** in regional **Defense** spending resulting in a 2% CAGR.
- Both DHS and GSA spending in the region declined from FY 2009-2012, with -5% and-12% CAGRs, respectively. DHS saw decreases of close to \$600M each in IT and professional services spending, including a \$260M decrease on the US-VISIT program.
 GSA's significant drop was driven by a \$1.3B decrease in purchasing/leasing of facilities and equipment spending from FY2009-2012.
- HHS and Department of Transportation both experienced growth at 4% and 8% CAGRs, respectively. The big boost in HHS spending is a result of the CMS CCIIO Healthcare Insurance Exchange, while slightly increased spending on the FAA's En Route Automation Modernization (ERAM) program and the uptick of work on the NextGen Network Enabled Weather (NNEW) program drive the growth in the Department of Transportation.

Half of all reported federal IT spending, and a third of all professional services reported federal spending, is associated with the region.

More than half of both the regional IT and professional services spending takes place in Virginia.

The top four regional federal industries experienced growth from FY 2009-2012, while AEC experienced a significant decrease:





Spending Snapshot: District of Columbia

- In the District of Columbia, the Navy saw modest growth with a 3% CAGR, but both the Departments of State and Transportation saw double-digit growth, with 14% and 25% CAGRs, respectively. DHS, GSA and DOJ reduced spending in DC, with -11%, -25%, and -20% CAGRs.
- **Professional Services rule in DC**, totaling over \$34B, driven by DHS, Navy and Department of Labor spending.
- Booz Allen Hamilton's primary market in DC is Professional Services, driven by obligations from DHS and OPM.
 96% of Creative Information Technology Inc.'s obligations are from the State Department for IT.













FY 2009-2012 Spending Snapshot: Maryland

- Of the top five departments, only the Army saw negative growth. Navy spending was flat, with a 1% CAGR, HHS and NASA both had a 4% CAGR, and Defense grew at 26% CAGR.
- IT spending grew at a 4% CAGR, driven by increased spending from Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services(CMS) and the Defense Intelligence Systems Agency (DISA).
- IT, Defense & Aerospace comprise the majority of Lockheed Martin's federal work in the state. The company's largest IT customer is the FAA. The majority of ASRC's obligations are from NASA for IT and Professional Services.










Spending Snapshot: Virginia

- Federal spending in the state has been flat, with decreased spending in three of the top five spending departments: Army, Defense and DHS. The Navy experienced slight growth, 1% CAGR, and the Air Force spending grew at a 6% CAGR.
- **AEC suffered the biggest decline in federal spending**, with a -21% CAGR, while there was **modest growth in the remaining top markets**: IT, Professional Services, Defense & Aerospace, and Research & Development at 2%,1%,1% and 2% CAGRs, respectively.
- Over half of Northrop Grumman's obligations are for IT, with the Navy, Army and DoD as it's top IT customers. Significant growth associated with SAIC's obligations in the state may be attributed to the move of the company's headquarters from San Diego, CA to McLean, VA. Eyak's primary work in the state supporting the USACE to provide technology for infrastructure, geospatial, and environmental requirements, has ended. Microtechnologies has leveraged its portfolio of GSA Schedules and GWACs, including Schedule 70, SEWP IV, and VETS, to grow its IT business base in the state.


